Through the arts, children and youth develop the capacity for creative selfexpression that teaches them how to engage with the world.

Arts Umbrella is more than just art education—it's preparation for life. Arts education is proven to help kids develop academic skills, boost personal growth, self-discipline and well-being, but that's not all—the confidence, self-esteem, self-love we unleash in our studios is theirs forever.

Many of our students will grow up to be successful artists, but many more will grow up to be successful adults-confident, strong and ready to take on the world. This is why we "inspire creativity. For good."



Arts Umbrella is a family affair. Every student who walks through our doors has a home here. And as our family grows larger, we measure success in our graduates, like Rachel McNamee, and victory in our volunteers, like Caroline, who happens to be Rachel's mother.

RACHEL

"Life revolves around dance," says Rachel. "I revolve around dance." Rachel began dancing at three-years-old and joined Arts Umbrella in 2005. For the next nine years, Rachel, now 20, would spend more time in Dance Studio 108 than she would sleeping in her own bed.

Now employed across the globe by the acclaimed Nederlands Dans Theater (NDT), her roots are firmly grounded here. "Although I have graduated, I know I can always call Arts Umbrella home. The studio walls have witnessed some of my most vulnerable moments. Arts Umbrella was a safe place, a comfort to me. I am proud to name Arts Umbrella as my school. I am excited to go back and see what it has become now too. It is in constant development, always pushing for more. I am excited to see where the new graduates of this year have gone, beyond where we left off."

In a competitive field, Arts Umbrella leads the march. We strive to bring the best mentors, the top-tier of instructors, and the most passionate advocates into the family fold. Our students are our commitment, and they deserve the finest program. The Rachels of the world deserve nothing less.

"Arts Umbrella is known to "produce" a certain standard of dancer," Rachel says. "But more than that, it "produces" good people. If I never dance another day in my life, I would not change a thing about my commitment to it. I will never regret the thousands of hours spent or the sacrifices I had to make. So much of who I am, so much of how I view and approach the world, I owe to Arts Umbrella."

"We're taught to look beyond the present moment and immediate success. Success is constantly being reevaluated. It's not about winning or being the best. It is about how far you are pushing yourself everyday and where your own journey takes you. And we are taught that development does not stop once we leave Arts Umbrella. Arts Umbrella is the beginning of a world of growth, knowledge, and challenges."

Arts Umbrella is not a factory producing generic artists. We nurture the creativity in all our students, offering guidance and direction that, yes can be useful in their practice of the arts, but is also applicable to their everyday lives. "We are given incredible opportunities beyond ourselves—opportunities other programs and even professionals may not get—and are expected to rise to the challenge. We are taught not just choreography and technique, but respect, community, and perseverance. We are taught to value every experience, to take ownership of our own experiences."

Young women like Rachel had all the right talent at birth; but Arts Umbrella—the environment, the mentors, the emotional supportfacilitated her development and moulded her into the young woman she is today: mature, articulate, confident and cultured. Rachel, you have made your Arts Umbrella family proud.

By the time Rachel was 13 Caroline McNamee, Rachel's Mom was a proactive member of the Dance Company Parent Executive. Caroline's three sons would also dabble in programs at Arts Umbrella, each of the young boys inspired by their sister's ambition.

"I love Arts Umbrella and cannot imagine a better place for Rachel to have grown up in." says Caroline. "I am so thankful for all that they have offered her. Many of my closest friends have been the teachers and parents I have met through Arts Umbrella."

In comparison to other arts organizations, Arts Umbrella prides itself on its child-first mentality. This approach is a large part of the appeal to Caroline. "Arts Umbrella is a serious art institute that seeks to bring art to all. While they certainly prepare students for careers in the arts, they nurture all young people so that they become better people and well-rounded citizens, even if art, dance, or theatre is not their future career."



The power of creativity knows no boundaries, and neither do we. Thanks to our generous supporters, Arts Umbrella's outreach programs deliver free-of-charge programs to students in communities across Metro Vancouver. Our outreach classes, workshops and performances remove geographical, cultural and social-economic barriers that may prevent children from having an opportunity to explore their creativity, and experience the benefits of the arts.

Our school visits have a proven record of impacting the lives of kids who might otherwise have missed out on their true calling.

"When I was around 6, Arts Umbrella came to our school. I was always terrible at art (like painting and drawing), but on this visit, it was a theatre workshop. I was a shy kid but I loved watching movies, and in private settings I was a goofball; I loved being a clown. In an improv group, I really came into my own in that environment: I was putting on ideas and being very open. It was the first time that I was on stage, and my class loved it. I received large, positive reactions from my peers—definitely something I wasn't used to as a shy, quiet kid!

This is where I got bit with the bug. Arts Umbrella gave me my first significant exposure to the performing arts. Later, this led to me becoming involved in theatre in high school, and eventually receiving my Diploma in Film Production from Vancouver Film School.

But if I hadn't been to school that day when Arts Umbrella came, I don't even want to think about where I would be now."

Paneet has come full circle. After Arts Umbrella inspired him 15 years ago, he now works at Arts Umbrella as an assistant instructor and a student services assistant, Welcome back, Paneet!

Last year Arts Umbrella was able to reach over 14,000 kids through free-of-charge or reduced rate programs. Our workshops and performances provide many children with firsthand exposure to the arts they might not otherwise receive.

The arts have unconditional impact; we know this to be true. Regardless of their circumstance—good or bad—all young people can benefit from the arts. Through artistic expression, endeavour, and exploration, they can find the means to be their true selves.



Fourteen-year-old Raven Ceres' passion and talent for theatre is obvious when you meet her. Through Arts Umbrella's bursary program, Raven has been able to pursue her dream of becoming a professional actor.

Born in Vancouver and raised in Costa Rica, Raven got her inspiration from watching Saturday Night Live (SNL), and Latin soap operas. "A lot of kids have a favourite toy, like a Barbie or something, but when I was little my favourite thing was a mullet wig. I loved to wear it and take selfies with my mom's camera, or walk around town with it on

talking in a southern accent. Unfortunately, living in Costa Rica meant few opportunities to do any real acting. So, when I was eleven-years old, I moved to Vancouver to fulfill my dreams of becoming a professional actor.

A second year member of Arts Umbrella Theatre's Junior Troupe, Raven has come into her own. After discovering Arts Umbrella as a Summer Camp student in 2011, she enrolled in the Teen Theatre Intensive program before becoming a member of Junior Troupe.

"One of my favourite memories from Junior Troupe last year was going on tour to elementary schools. It made me feel like I was inspiring all the odd kids in the audience, the ones that were just as weird and crazy as I am to be themselves; it was a really good feeling."

"I'm so lucky and grateful to have this bursary. It lets me have another year at Arts Umbrella, because without it I wouldn't be able to. So now I can continue to go to the place where people accept me as the weird person I am."

"I really feel that Arts Umbrella is helping me achieve my goal of becoming a professional actor—and hopefully one day working for SNL. So if anyone knows [SNL producer] Lorne Michaels please introduce me to him."

Raven is an example of Arts Umbrella's ongoing commitment to bring creativity to as many children in Metro Vancouver as possible. Through the support of our generous donors, Arts Umbrella was able to provide 403 children reduced tuition through bursary in 2013; children who may otherwise not have experienced the creative joy and freedom of the arts.

OFFSITE **Reaching Students Closer to Home**



Rebecca Pitfield, a mother of two and part-time worker, is a passionate advocate for Arts Umbrella, and the arts in general.

"Art is an amazing outlet for kids. And if it's something they can hold onto, it's important for society. Art is very healing and is something that should be a part of our culture. Art is crucial; it creates a more peaceful child, reducing hyperactivity and anxiety. I think Arts Umbrella is a really important place to put money. This is very important for children; *it keeps their options open and creates* the chance to develop an artist. Kids need these outlets to nurture their creativity."

Tell us a little about yourself. My name is Jason Dowdeswell, Vice-President of Production for Sony Pictures Imageworks. Primarily we do visual effects and feature animation

How did your experience at Arts Umbrella affect you?

My experience at Arts Umbrella helped shape my whole career. The opportunity to explore my true interest at a young age in a professional setting helped pave the way to my artistic future. Arts Umbrella gave me the creative and work ethic skills that put me ahead of my peers at an early age. The creative problem solving I learned while at Arts Umbrella I use daily.


Why do you believe it's important for kids to have access to arts training? Arts education trains the mind to see and feel with the imaginative part of the brain. Imagination and creativity are not part of most Western primary/secondary school curriculums, so it needs to be captured at facilities like Arts Umbrella.

What was one of your favourite Arts Umbrella moments?

Being treated like an adult. It was my animation instructor who encouraged me to enter a competition for professional animators. My instructor impressed upon the class that even if young in age, we were also professional. I submitted my idea and won!

Arts Umbrella Dance Company visits Europe

After a year of bake sales, car washes and other fundraising activities, the Arts Umbrella Dance Company spent two weeks this past spring touring the Netherlands and Italy as part of their "European Project Tour." With the help of ten support staff, thirty-three senior dancers took intensive workshops and performed works by leading international choreographers Gioconda Barbuto, Lesley Telford, Iratxe Ansa, Walter Matteini and Simone Orlando. One particular highlight for our dancers was an opportunity to perform with the premier dance company of Europe, Nederlands Dans Theater in Holland.

A Mother's Letter to Arts Umbrella

When my family first moved to Vancouver, we began to hear a great deal about Arts Umbrella. Through friends and other parents, we heard rave reviews. When my son Darwin expressed an interest in dance, Arts Umbrella was the obvious choice. Darwin was overjoyed to participate in a real dance school, and to dance in such a beautiful studio. On his first day he said, "It's just like Martha Graham's studio!" At four-years old, [dancer] Martha Graham is his Spiderman. He studies her movements and her mannerisms, and the dancers in her company. He is inspired, and determined, to become a dancer and choreographer, just like Martha.

He would find a way to work Martha Graham into almost every conversation. While children his own age seldom had anything to add, he was delighted to find a kindred spirit in his dance teacher. She spoke his language. She would ask him about Martha after class, discuss the way she held out her hands, and even gave him a Martha Graham book from her own library. Once he knew Arts Umbrella was a safe place to be himself and encouraged him to express what was most important to him, there was this explosion of creativity. His dancing, his drawing, and his confidence, all took a huge leap forward.

It may be 2014 but I'm always surprised to find people who still hold tight to the antiquated and damaging idea that "dance is for girls." He hears it more often than a






