In 1979, Arts Umbrella opened its doors to 45 children, an endeavour buoyed by the dream of five passionate artists concerned about the lack of arts education available to young people in the community. Their dream was to instill in all children a love of the arts and to inspire young people to become confident, creative, and compassionate citizens.

Over the more than four decades since then, we have continued to build on the vision established by Arts Umbrella's founders, striving to provide a place where young people ages 2-22 can flourish, developing strength and confidence and finding the freedom that comes with self-expression.

Our Philosophy

Whole-self learning is the philosophy that guides every program at Arts Umbrella. From toddlers arriving for their first visual arts, dance, or theatre class to teens training in our intensive programs before heading out into the professional world, we believe that arts education goes past training artists who are proficient at their craft. We provide the space and time for students to examine the world and their place in it, using their arts education as a foundation for life, no matter where their path takes them.

Rigour and Opportunity

All programs at Arts Umbrella are led by a faculty of more than 200 arts educators and practicing artists that bring a wealth of educational and professional experience to our studios. Our student journey includes pre-school to post-secondary, offering access at every stage of a young person's development. Fundamentals of craft and technique are established for every discipline. At all levels, students are encouraged to engage critically with the challenges set before them as opportunities, knowing the rewards of accomplishment that spring from hard work, self-discipline, and dedication.

A Caring Community

At Arts Umbrella, students and their families find a community of peers who are engaged and similarly passionate. Though art can be an inherently individual pursuit, training is elevated by working collaboratively. Students discover self through relationships with others and responsibility to the ensemble; that which an individual brings to their craft strengthens and elevates the group as a whole.

A Multi-Disciplinary Hub

The opportunities provided to our students are limitless. Studios specific to each discipline allow instructors to teach and students to train to their fullest potential. Unique to Arts Umbrella is the offering of so many artistic disciplines in the same space. From clay sculpture and sketching techniques to musical theatre and filmmaking to ballet and choreographic workshops, Arts Umbrella students arrive to learn and leave inspired, surrounded by other young people's imagined creations taking form.

Accessible Arts Education

At Arts Umbrella, we strive to ensure that all young people, regardless of economic or social circumstance, are provided with the opportunity to access a high-quality arts education. We reach approximately 20,000 young people annually across Metro Vancouver and beyond! With nearly 75% served through bursaries, scholarships, and donor-funded community programs.

Art for All

At Arts Umbrella, we understand that for young people, physical and mental conditions, illnesses, and disabilities can occur for the first time or become more prominent. We acknowledge that for many students, barriers exist to accessing the right care, medical diagnoses, treatments, tools, and/or medication options. Arts Umbrella strives to support students, whether they have a diagnosis or not, and we are always learning how to make our classes more comfortable for our diverse range of students.

ELF lets our age 3-5 students experience a variety of art forms in one half-day session that has been designed with the busy lives of families in mind. Caregivers have the flexibility to drop-off to supervised studios between 8:30am and 8:45am and pick-up between 11:30am and 12pm. While the program gives children an enriched adventure in the arts, caregivers have a 3-hour window to work, catch-up with friends or have some me time.



New - Explorers

Students age 5-6 will embark on a yearlong exploration of various artforms in this weekly, afterschool class. Dynamic programming will include Art & Design, Dance, Music, and Theatre. With the area of focus changing every 5-8 weeks, Explorers gives our young students a chance to try a bit of everything and perhaps, discover their passion.

New - Mini Sessions

We will be offering a handful of Early Learning classes as Mini Sessions. These are shorter sessions that will run for 5-7 weeks throughout our regular programming. Mini Sessions will be offered for age 5-6 Creative Dance, age 3-5 Art Start, age 3-5 Creative Drama, and age 4-6 Drawing & Painting.

General Program

The Art & Design General Program is made up of sessional classes, offered in three terms throughout the year: Fall, Winter, and Spring. These programs have no pre-requisite and projects vary by session and instructor. Spring Session students have the opportunity to have their work displayed to the public as a part of Arts Umbrella's annual Expressions Festival in June, a celebration of student accomplishments over the past school year.

Admissions & Registration

No previous experience required. Registration for all programs and sessions opens June 1, 2025.

ANIMATION PROGRAMS

Students apply art and design fundamentals to create characters, settings, and stories and learn how to bring them to life through time and motion. Using a range of techniques and tools—from mixed media and plasticine to Adobe Animate and Blendr—students learn how to use storyboards, animatics, and character design to tell unique stories. All materials used in class are provided, including computers and software.

Claymation

Ages 6-8, 9-12

Students learn to sculpt characters and props with plasticine, developing the model making and animation skills that are unique to this particular form of stop motion animation made famous by Wallace and Gromit. Working at our animation stations to compose and capture frame-by-frame movement, students develop an intuition for the principles of animation, from squash and stretch to timing and exaggeration. Students work with DSLR cameras and the industry-standard software, DragonFrame.

Stop Motion Animation

Ages 6-8, 9-12

Students learn how to give life to the everyday world of readymade objects by arranging and photographing them frame-by-frame. This technique is fundamental to all animation practices, and invites students to work with a wide variety of materials, from hand-drawn characters and props to readymade objects, textiles, collage, and the students themselves. Students work with DSLR cameras and the industry-standard software, DragonFrame.

2D Digital Animation

Ages 6-8, 9-12, 13+

In our MacLab, students bring their drawings to life using software such as Adobe Animate. At early levels, students develop basic computer skills and cover animation fundamentals such as frame rate, the timeline, and storyboarding. Teens will expand on those with projects that challenge their skills to include basic concepts such as tweening, lip-syncing and rigging.

3D Modeling & Animation

Ages 9-12, 13+

Students learn how to sculpt and build their own digital 3D models to create characters, build worlds and design props. They will also learn how to access and download ready-to-use 3D assets to create movement and motion through key frames, tweening and timelines to be used in animations or video game sequences. Students will learn the basics of software such as Blendr and Unity to gain fundamental skills and see their stories come to life.

ARCHITECTURE PROGRAMS

Students explore the architectural design process, learning the basics of space, function, form, texture, and balance, along with technical skills in drafting and model making. As students progress, they learn principles of urban design and community development, building a well-rounded design practice.

Architecture

Ages 6-8, 9-12 | offered at Surrey Centre

Students learn the fundamentals of architectural design, from sketching to model making, developing their creative problem-solving skills as they lay out floor plans and build 3D structures using cardboard and mixed media. Classes for older students focus on developing more conceptually rigorous designs, through projects based on real-life urban design and architecture case studies.

Architecture & Environmental Design

Ages 13+

Students create 3D architectural models, learning the conceptual and technical fundamentals of the architectural design process, exploring ideas in urban planning and theory, and discussing the relationships between natural and built environments. Realworld case studies are used to inspire projects and discussion on topics such as energy conservation, water management, and sustainability rating systems.

CARTOONING & GRAPHIC NOVEL PROGRAMS

Students apply design and visual art foundations to bring characters and stories to life in the form of cartoons, comics, and graphic novels. As they progress, students build complexity in both their technical and storytelling skills.

Comics & Cartooning

Ages 6-8, 9-12

Students learn how to tell captivating illustrated stories using the most fundamental principles of visual art including bold lines, simple shapes, and strong colour choices. Students learn to apply simplification and exaggeration to communicate their stories with clarity and humour. Working with pen, pencil, marker, and ink, students learn to create sequential action, movement, story, and sound through the graphic conventions of cartooning and comics. Students also learn panel layout, character sheets, speech bubbles, and hand-lettering.

Character Design & Illustration

Ages 6-8, 9-12, 13+

Students delve into the rich process of creating memorable characters with distinctive personality, visual appearance, aesthetic

and behaviour, as well as how this form of concept art is be used in animation, comics, video games and more. From figure drawing to facial expression, costume design to props, students will learn all aspects of how the human (or non-human) figure can be used to tell imaginative stories.

Graphic Novel

Ages 9-12, 13+

Students learn the fundamentals of graphic novel creation, from character design and narrative structure to page layout and lettering, working with standard tools for graphic novel illustration—like non-photo blue pencils, brush pens, and alcohol markers. Students further develop their skills, and their original stories, as they progress. At the end of the term completed short comics are scanned to print a unique creation.

MEDIA ARTS PROGRAMS

Students apply design and visual art foundations to projects specific to the digital world. In earlier levels, students build digital, computer, and creative software literacy, skillsets that support them as they progress.

Digital Painting & Design

Ages 6-8, 9-12

Students learn how to create expressive digital artworks in our MacLab using a digital tablet, stylus pen and easy-to-use, industry-standard software such as Adobe Photoshop, Illustrator, Kid Pix, and Krita. Essential computer literacy skills will also be taught while they explore fundamental drawing & painting concepts in the digital sphere such as digital brushes, colours, and blending layers. Students will also learn to apply design to their digital art to create movie posters, book covers, story illustrations, and more.

Filmmaking & Editing

Ages 9-12, 13+

From short films to YouTube videos, students are introduced to the essential processes of filmmaking, editing and digital content creation. Students learn industry standard software and

tools, including iMovie, Adobe Rush, Premiere Pro, and After Effects,. They will also be introduced to the technical aspects of filmmaking using both DSLR and handheld video cameras, as well as working on a team to collaborate on a movie production. As students progress, advanced processes might also be covered from storyboarding, scriptwriting and shot selection to lighting, green screen, and sound recording.

Video Game Design

Ages 9-12, 13+

Using PC laptops, students learn the theory and practice of game design, from world building, level design and theme development to the details of individual game mechanics. Students design graphic assets for their own games, and then add interactivity using software such as GDevelop.

PHOTOGRAPHY PROGRAMS

Arts Umbrella is home to one of the only fully functional educational darkrooms left in Vancouver, Students learn the fundamentals of photography, including exposure, depth-of-field, composition, photo developing, and presentation using a 35mm film camera. Technical skills learned include shooting speeds, black & white film processing, photograms, and cyanotypes. Cameras and all materials are provided for each student.

Darkroom Photography

Ages 9-12, 13+

The basics of film photography and photo developing are introduced to budding photographers, using a 35mm camera to shoot and a fully appointed darkroom to develop images in black and white. Students will learn the principles of lens selection, lighting, composition through a variety of shooting scenarios including street and studio photography. They will also learn the fundamentals of image editing through analog techniques such as burning, dodging and blending and be introduced to more experimental darkroom processes and cameras.

Digital Photography & Photoshop

Ages 9-12, 13+

Students learn how to compose, light and shoot a wide array of captivating images using DSLR cameras and will explore the endless creative possibilities when editing them in Adobe Photoshop. Light, colour and composition will be mixed with cutting, collaging, blending and digital painting to create unique digital expressions. They will be introduced to the technical features of the camera including aperture, shutter speed, and ISO as well as the digital tools of Photoshop. From street photography and editorial images to green screened special effects, students will learn how to consider the camera and computer as creative tools for their own unique artistic expression.

SCULPTURE & CERAMICS PROGRAMS

Students build, paint, and decorate 2D and 3D works using the principles of form, volume, texture, line, and colour and materials such as clay, pastels, plaster, and wood. They learn skills such as handbuilding, pinch-pot, coiling, sculpting, and glazing.

Ceramics

Ages 9-12, 13+

Students delve into the world of pottery and ceramic design as they bring concept sketches to life and explore contemporary approaches to an age-old practice. This class focuses on the technique of wheel-throwing alongside fundamental handbuilding techniques such as pinch pot, coil, and slab work to create thrown or manipulated fired-ceramic objects and will also include the use of mixed glazes to finish.

Clay Sculpture

Parent & Me, Ages 2-3, 3-5, 4-6, 6-8, 9-12, 13+

Students learn the entire process of clay sculpting from idea design to fired and glazed three-dimensional object, focusing on the use of essential hand-building techniques such as pinch-pot, coiling, and slab work to create experimental creative objects with a focus on texture, form and expression using glazing, hand-painting and mixed media to decorate and finish. As they build, students develop focus, recognizing self and others, and listening skills. In Parent & Me classes, caregivers and students work together to build, paint, and decorate 2D and 3D fired ceramic pieces.

Mixed Media & Sculpture

Ages 3-5, 4-6, 6-8

Students create 3D works (or bring 2D pieces to life with added 3D elements) by transforming and combining different materials including wood, papier mâché, textiles, paper, paint, thread, and more. Students are taught and encouraged to use fundamental design elements such as space, texture, and line and develop building skills such as cutting, sculpting, gluing, and assemblage.

Sculpture

Ages 9-12, 13+

Students create 3D artworks by combining and transforming a range of materials, discovering the special qualities of each, and exploring significant themes in contemporary sculpture. Working in the Arts Umbrella wood shop, students are introduced to safe tool use, and experiment with processes including assemblage, forming, carving, and casting. Fundamental concepts such as materiality, space, movement, and texture are incorporated into the creative process.

VISUAL ARTS PROGRAMS

Young artists build a foundation for art and design through taskbased projects, gathering inspiration through story, studying established artists and traditions, still-life observation, image reference, purposeful play, and imagination. Students build an understanding of symbols, the use of tools, and technical processes while also developing focus, effective listening skills, and an understanding of self in relation to others. As students progress, more advanced concepts and artistic techniques are introduced and built upon.

Parent & Me Visual Arts

Ages 2-3 | offered at Surrey Centre

Caregivers and students create 2D and 3D visual artworks together, exploring different mediums and processes such as pastel, marker, paint, and cardboard. Foundational elements of visual arts are introduced, including texture, shape, line, colour, and repetition.

Art Start (Included in ELF)

Ages 3-5

Young artists begin their journey, creating 2D and 3D pieces across mediums and processes. Students are introduced to working with various materials such as paint, wood, cardboard, pastel, and pencil. Technical skills such as mark-making, colourmixing, gluing, and building are also introduced.

Drawing & Painting

Ages 3-5, 4-6, 6-8, 9-12, 13+ | offered at Surrey Centre Students explore methods of visual image-making, using a variety of drawing, sketching, and painting techniques inspired by reference, observation, and imagination. Purposeful play is used with the youngest students to develop the use of tools such as pencil, marker, pastel, paint, and ink, as well as life-skills such as confident self-expression, understanding feelings, and effective listening skills. As students progress, understanding is deepened through increased self-direction, discussion of artists, art history and the use of symbols, abstraction, and representation. More advanced technique, tools, and materials (such as acrylic) are introduced in teen classes.

Drawing Principles & Techniques

Ages 9-12, 13+

Students deepen their study of what is arguably the most direct and intimate of all art processes: drawing. Students will learn the fundamental techniques and visual concepts related to making marks on a surface to create an image. Line, gesture, composition, tone, value and expression will all be explored through a variety of references include from image, still life, the figure and including abstraction and the use of imagination and chance. They will focus on the use of dry materials such as graphite pencil, conte, charcoal, marker, and pastel to create expressive works on paper.

Painting Principles & Techniques

Ages 9-12, 13+

Students dive deep into the key processes, techniques, methods and materials that underly the practice of painting. They will use a variety of wet mediums including tempera, acrylic, gouache, watercolour and ink to blend, colour mix, and layer to create dynamic works of art. They will be inspired by a variety of references including from image and still life to explore how paint can express ideas and stories through landscape, portraiture, narrative, figurative and abstraction. As students progress, understanding is deepened through increased self-direction, discussion of artists, art history and the use of symbols.

The Foundation Program is built on the principles of visual and contemporary arts that prioritizes sound technical skills with critical, creative expression. Together these provide the ideal conditions for deeply passionate artists to flourish. This program aims to reach big and dive deep to establish a solid foundation for an expressive artistic practice to flourish.

The Foundation Program is a yearlong, twice weekly program that's composed of one yearlong "core" discipline in combination with a rotation of inspiring "explore" classes. This structure is designed to establish solid technical and conceptual roots while exposing them to the exciting breadth of the visual and contemporary arts. They will develop essential skills of self-expression, empathy and creative agency to become well-rounded and confident human beings.

All age groups will benefit from expanded learning opportunities that are unique to the Foundation Program including formal exhibitions, celebratory receptions, and optional field trips.

Junior

Ages 7-8

Students in the Junior Foundation Program will follow a specialized student journey that is composed of essential visual and contemporary art practices including a yearlong Core discipline in Visual Arts accompanied by a rotation of five exciting Explore classes including: Clay Sculpture, Stop-Motion Animation, Architecture, Printmaking, and Sculpture.

Intermediate

Ages 9-10, 11-12

Students in the Intermediate Foundation Program will be introduced to more choice in both their yearlong Core class (Visual Arts or Media Arts) and their Explore classes, where they get to choose from our exciting suite of contemporary-themed elective options, including Video & Special Effects, Ceramics, Darkroom Photography, Architecture, Fashion Design, Creative Electronics, and more. Registration opens for returning students in May. Registration for new students is by application, requiring a portfolio submission and statement of intent. Submissions are accepted on a rolling basis throughout June, July, and August.

The Art & Design Intensive Program is a yearlong, once-perweek program designed for students ages 10-12 and 13-19 who wish to dive deep into a focused program area and develop a more thorough and rigorous artistic practice. Students will push themselves on more advanced concepts of craft and technique and develop close community in supportive purpose-built studio environments. At the core of the curriculum is the enhanced development of each students' voice through close mentorship and expanded learning opportunities such as group critique and exhibition. Regular attendance is required.

Architecture & Environmental Design

Ages 10-12, 13+

In an immersive studio environment, students engage in research and critique on a variety of contemporary topics such as energy conservation, water management, car culture, sustainable landscapes, and sustainability. Creative approaches to building public spaces and urban design are explored. Both as an individual and in groups, students plan, sketch, and build models that bring their ideas to life.

Clay Sculpture

Ages 13-19

In a purpose-built ceramics studio, students will expand their practice of contemporary sculptural clay sculpture ceramics and engage in handbuilding, carving or sculpting techniques to advance further their understanding of fundamental advanced materials, equipment, techniques, and processes. They will study both contemporary and historical art references and develop critical creative approaches to sculptural ceramicsclay forms.

Ceramics

Ages 10-12, 13-19

Students will delve deep into the world of ceramic design, including both functional-ware and experimental clay forms. They will focus on wheel throwing techniques, glazing, and kiln firing methods to develop a contemporary and art historical knowledge of craftsmanship, design thinking, and materiality. Use of surface design and texture to convey story, culture and identity will also be explored.

Drawing & Painting

Ages 10-12, 13-15, 13-19, 15-19 | offered at Surrey Centre Students learn to apply their fine art practice to the field of contemporary image-making and material exploration. Advanced use of materials, methods, concepts and subject matter are all explored as students expand their application of core drawing and painting skills and techniques. They will engage in more critical approaches to art making and study both contemporary and historical art references.

Stop-Motion Animation

Ages 10-12, 13-19

Students will learn to apply their animation practice to the timeless tradition of stop-motion animation. They will advance their understanding of essential processes, tools, and equipment including the use of LED lighting, DSLR camera rigs, and professional animation software. They will explore a variety of material genres including clay, object, and cutout animations and develop critical approaches to storytelling, character design, and world-building. They will learn from both classic and contemporary animation references to develop a critical and creative approach to the craft of stop-motion.

3D Modeling & Animation

Ages 10-12, 13-19

Students will learn all aspects of the 3D modelling and animation workflow using industry-standard software such as Blendr and Unity. They will build creative and technical skills in modeling, texturing, rigging, animation, lighting, and rendering to create unique characters, build memorable environments, and complete a short animation using storyboarding, key frames, tweening and other essential processes.



Creative Dance: Parent & Me

Ages 1-2, 2-3

This joyful class invites young children and caregivers to explore dance through playful movement, props, and imagination. Fostering motor skills, creativity, and connection, it emphasizes musicality and coordination in a nurturing space. No experience needed—just bring energy and enthusiasm as you move, create, and bond together. Caregivers participate fully.

Creative Dance (Included in ELF)

Ages 3-4

In this playful, imagination-rich class, young dancers participate independently as they explore movement through stories, props, and inventive expression. They build confidence, coordination, and body awareness while developing foundational dance skills. Social interaction and creative expression are encouraged, supporting artistic and emotional growth in a joyful, nurturing environment.

Creative Dance: Pre-Ballet

Ages 4-5, 5-6

This joyful bridge to formal ballet introduces young dancers to basic ballet vocabulary, musicality, and spatial awareness. Through guided exercises, students build coordination, flexibility, and confidence while learning to follow instructions and move with intention. Creative exploration blends with age-appropriate ballet fundamentals to support skill development and expressive movement.

Ballet: Levels 1-7

Ages 6-13

These ballet classes provide an introduction to the world of ballet technique with a focus on alignment, form, and overall body strength. Concepts of posture and alignment, basic movement fundamentals, and coordination are all practiced in a supportive and well-paced environment.

In this program, students take a minimum of one ballet class per week. Additional classes, such as jazz, character, contemporary, modern, and/or Broadway jazz are offered. Students must be taking ballet in order to add any additional styles of dance. Placement is determined by academic grade. For example, Level 2 dancers are in Grade 2 and do not need to have completed Level 1. Younger students attend 1-2 classes per week, gradually increasing to four classes per week by Level 5.

Hip Hop

Ages 6-18

In Hip Hop, students think on their feet and move their way through group dances, percussion games, and choreography. Energizing and fast-paced, this class develops rhythm, coordination, focus, strength, and agility, without losing the beat of fun.

Teen Program

Ages 13-18

Classes are offered in ballet, modern, and jazz, and offer teen dancers with as little as one year of dance experience a casual schedule that allows time for other activities outside of school and dance. Options are available for 2-4 classes per week, requiring a commitment of just 3-6 hours. Students must be taking ballet in order to add any additional styles of dance.

Admission to Levels 3IP, 4IP, and 5IP is by consultation with faculty. Auditions are required for the Afternoon Professional Training Program and Pre-Elementary Program.

Intensive Program

Ages 8-10 | Levels 3IP, 4IP, and 5IP

The Intensive Program is designed for students who wish to advance their technique, with classes in ballet, jazz, character, contemporary, conditioning, and Cecchetti Exam Preparation. All dancers are required to take the full program as designed, attending 3-5 classes per week.

After completing Level 5IP, students may audition for Pre-Elementary, APT Junior, or continue with General Program Level 6.

Dancers enrolled in 3IP, 4IP, and 5IP must attend one week of our Junior Summer Dance Intensive each summer.

Admissions are made in consultation with Dance Faculty.

Pre-Elementary

Ages 11-12 | Levels 6-7

This after-school program introduces dancers to the rigour and physical demands of professional training, with a primary focus on ballet. Students take 11-16 hours of class per week, receiving an in-depth education with an emphasis on technique, vocabulary, and style. In addition to regular classes, advanced students work with renowned guest artists and perform world-class choreography through participation in Arts Umbrella Dance Company. Performances are an integral part of the program, through which students develop a strong sense of community and a thorough understanding of their craft.

Dancers enrolled must attend our two-week intensive program, ISDI2, each summer.

Admissions are by audition.

Afternoon Professional Training Program

Ages 11-18

This after-school program is designed for committed teen dancers. The APT student is interested in devoting time to the development of their dance education and performance opportunities. Discipline, focus, and time management are required, as students will maintain a full-time school schedule while dancing 8-12 hours per week.



Cecchetti Syllabus & Exams

The Cecchetti method is a style of ballet developed by Enrico Cecchetti in the early 1900s. Arts Umbrella utilizes this method because the exercises provide useful techniques without compromising musicality and choreographic style. The benefits to following a set training syllabus are many, including helping to articulate a structure to facilitate dancers setting personal goals and documenting growth. The Syllabus, exams, and presentation classes also serve as markers for a student's individual progress as a dancer.

At Arts Umbrella, students in Levels 3IP, 4IP, 5IP, Pre-Elementary 1, Pre-Elementary 2, Elementary, Intermediate, and Advanced follow the Cecchetti training syllabus. Participation in examinations is optional, but strongly recommended. Exams take place at the end of June, with additional preparation workshops leading up to exams in April-June.

The Arts Umbrella Dance Professional Training Program demands and fosters high levels of physical strength, technique, and discipline. Higher levels are designed for advanced dancers seriously considering a professional dance career. In addition to regular classes, advanced students work with renowned guest artists and perform world-class choreography through participation in Arts Umbrella Dance Company. Performances are an integral part of the program, through which students develop a strong sense of community and a thorough understanding of their craft.

Professional Training Program

Ages 13-18 | Elementary, Intermediate, Senior, Advanced, Pre-Grad

This advanced half-day program was designed to offer high school students an enriched arts education - one that uses dance to develop cognitive and intellectual skills so graduates can purse a professional dance career, or an academic post-secondary route. This program provides young students with a well-rounded education supported in a community of likeminded people. Classes are six days a week, with a minimum of 25 hours weekly.

To complete their high school courses, students must either be home-schooled or have their high school provide a half-day academic program for them. We partner with Magee Secondary School who currently provides a half-day Sports and Arts program (SPARTS) that allows dancers to maintain a rigorous dance schedule alongside completing academic requirements in preparation for high school graduation and post-secondary opportunities. Students who attend Magee receive credits towards graduation from their training at Arts Umbrella.

Dancers enrolled in Elementary, Intermediate, Senior, Advanced, and Pre-Grad must attend our International Summer Dance Intensive (ISDI) each summer.

Post-Secondary **Programs**

Arts Umbrella Dance Post-Secondary Programs deliver rigorous dance training for dedicated students working towards a professional career in dance. For years, our program has been developing intelligent and motivated dance students into strong and in-demand dance artists.

Arts Umbrella graduates have been hired by critically lauded Canadian companies and cutting-edge contemporary companies around the world. These dancers are applauded as valuable company members for their maturity and understanding of the tenets of professional dance.

Post-Secondary Program

Ages 17+

This program provides students with a high-level dance education towards a professional career in dance. Applicants must be at an advanced ballet level with a pre-professional background. Daily classes include ballet, pointe, allegro, pas de deux, composition, improvisation, classical variations, body conditioning, health, jazz, and contemporary techniques. The program also features residencies with renowned guest choreographers as well as rehearsals and performances with the Arts Umbrella Dance Company.

Arts Umbrella/Vancouver Community College Dance Diploma Program

In partnership with Vancouver Community College, this twoyear program is designed for dancers seeking to develop an advanced level of technical and choreographic skill in preparation for a career in professional dance. In addition to the dance curriculum outlined in the Arts Umbrella Post-Secondary Program, students take academic classes in arts and culture, rhythm training, and career development. Students have access to VCC-related plans such as health and dental coverage and a discounted transit pass. Upon completion, students earn a post-secondary diploma.

INTERNATIONAL SUMMER DANCE INTENSIVE (ISDI)

Ages 13+ (Academic Grade 9 and up)

For three weeks in August every year, world-renowned teachers, choreographers and repetiteurs come to Arts Umbrella Granville Island to offer a dance experience that leads dancers to reach their full performance potential. The intensive full-day, three-week program includes classes such as ballet, repertoire, pointe, modern, contemporary, movement exploration, Gaga, Forsythe Improvisation Technologies, partnering, and coaching and conditioning.

JUNIOR & TEEN SUMMER DANCE INTENSIVES

Ages 7-12 (Junior) | Ages 12+ (Teen)

A comprehensive way to keep technique sharp over the Summer break and prepare for classes in September, these Junior and Teen programs are some of the few intensives for younger dancers in Metro Vancouver. Taking place at Arts Umbrella Granville Island, these ballet-based programs feature classes such as conditioning, jazz, repertoire, and hip hop taught by special quest instructors and Arts Umbrella faculty.

No auditions required. A minimum 1 year dance experience is required for Junior Summer Dance Intensive. 2 years dance experience is required for Teen Summer Dance Intensive.

ISDI2

Ages 11-13 (Academic Grade 6-8)

This two-week intensive program has been developed to recognize the need for dancers in Grade 6, 7, and 8 to experience a purposefully challenging program. Dancers who show potential to excel in a dense and comprehensive program will be encouraged to elevate their dance practice. The faculty of this program have been invited based on their professional perspective on current methods and choreographies. The intensive is ten full days of movement exploration, dance technologies, repertoire, body conditioning, and improvisation. Dancers are mentored and coached with the express intention of empowering dancers to move through the rigorous years of professional training ahead.

In addition to the immeasurable benefit of increasing their exposure and adaptability to the contemporary dance environment, these connections with the dance community create opportunities and open doors for our students to begin their careers as dance professionals.

General Program

Program Dates

All programs take place at Granville Island unless noted.

Admissions & Registration

No audition or pre-requisites required. Registration opens June 1, 2025.

The Theatre, Music & Film General Program is made up of sessional classes, offered in three terms throughout the year: Fall, Winter, and Spring. These programs have no pre-requisite and in-class exercises and activities vary by session and instructor.

General Program classes give young people an opportunity to discover the world of Musical Theatre, Theatre, Film, Stagecraft, and more, developing imagination, building confidence, and learning to work as part of a team. Supportive and knowledgeable instructors guide students, following a curriculum that focuses on process and personal development. At the end of each session, students present an inclass showcase of their work for family and friends.

FILM

Develop acting skills through exercises, readings, and improvisation, building confidence and self-awareness both on- and off-camera. Students also learn how to prepare as an actor and tackle creative projects, such as how to develop a dynamic character. Work filmed in class will be shared digitally with family at the end the term.

Film Acting

Ages 6-8, 9-12, 12-19 | offered at Surrey Centre Acting for film requires a slightly different skillset than acting for theatre. In this class, students study the fundamentals of acting, adding in considerations for angles, frames, and marks. Students also learn how to film a self-tape for auditions, both in front of and behind the camera.

Voice Acting

Ages 9-12

From cartoons to commercials and radio to video games, voiceover is an integral part of an actor's tool belt. In this class, students learn microphone technique and studio etiquette, and play with character voices as they explore the world of voice acting and see how to bring a script to life.

MUSIC

Students learn to confidently create sound and explore vocal ability to tell a story. As they advance, students work with matching pitch, recognizing musical structure, vocal dynamics, and exploring different genres of music.

Creative Music

Parent & Me, Ages 3-4, 4-5, 4-6 | offered at Surrey Centre Students will explore the voice and basic instruments, and are introduced to music terminology, tempo, rhythm, and scales. Using voice work and hand-held instruments such as drums and shakers, exercises encourage students to use their imagination, start to work with others, and build self-awareness. By Ages 4-6, students will be singing in rounds and are able to recognize the sound each instrument makes. In Parent & Me classes, caregivers are expected to participate fully with their student.

Private Voice

Ages 8+

Private singing instruction is the gold standard in learning to sing. Working 1-on-1 with an instructor, students learn the basics of music theory, review the structures and sensations of good singing, practice good vocal hygiene, and more. Some students will be invited to share their work at our year-end Cabaret nights in June.

MUSICAL THEATRE

Sing, act, and dance! As participants progress, they incorporate more intricate harmonies, complex dance steps, and advanced acting techniques to further develop their musical theatre artistry. At the end of each session, students present an in-class showcase of their work for family and friends.

Musical Theatre

Ages 6-8, 9-12

Students train as a "triple threat" in dance, music, and acting, building technique and complexity over time. Curriculum encourages students to make connections between their physical self, music, and story, and students develop their sense of self through communication and expression via song and dance. As they progress, students understand how elements of musical theatre come together to tell a story, understand stage directions, and build strong objectives and characters. Older students tackle more complex material and explore more specific acting techniques.

THEATRE

Students explore a variety of age-appropriate acting tools and techniques, with younger students developing imagination, creativity, self-confidence, and empathy in a fun and expressive way. As students progress, they learn to apply specific technique to solo and group scripts, improvisations, and devised work. Teen artists continue to sharpen their instincts to make stronger and more consistent choices and add the broader context of acting through studies of theatrical history.

Creative Design

Parent & Me, Ages 3-5, 4-6, 6-8

Through play and imagination, students are introduced to the "behind the scenes" world of theatre and the role of costumes, sets, props, and more. Using different stories as inspiration, students build pieces that help bring that world to life. Students learn elements of design thinking and problem solving, and the balance of safety and play in a building environment is emphasized. In Parent & Me classes, caregivers are expected to participate fully with their student.

Creative Drama (Included in ELF)

Parent & Me, Ages 3-4, 5-6

Little ones develop imagination, creativity, and self-confidence through games and theatre exercises, planting the seed for future theatre classes. Students explore storytelling and using their body to convey a story, discovering ways of relating to self, one another, and the world around them. In Parent & Me classes, caregivers are expected to participate fully with their student.

Acting

Ages 6-8, 9-12, 12-19

Students will study character creation, staging, and story structure, using theatre games and exercises to develop vocal control, awareness of breath and body, and more. As students advance, theatrical methods such as GOTE, Uta Hagen's 9 Questions, and Eight Efforts are introduced.

Sketch Comedy & Improv

Ages 6-8, 9-12

Yes, and! Through classic improv games and exercises, students develop comedic scenes and scripts as well as skills for life such as teamwork, problem-solving, confidence, and accepting feedback. Curriculum is guided by the principles of Viola Spolin's "Improvisation for the Theatre" and Del Close's "Harold" format. Long form, theatre sports, and comedy-based improv are explored at higher levels, once foundations in Spolin-style improvisation are firm.

Stagecraft

Ages 7-14

Learn the secrets of what goes on behind the scenes; how costumes, scenery, lighting and sound all work together with the actors create a production on the stage or the screen. Using age appropriate exercises, hands-on play and experimentation, students develop their understanding of the relationship between materials, design principles, and storytelling. Older students build on foundational skills with specific and more advanced techniques in scenic painting, prop building, lighting design and more.

Intensive **Programs**

At this level, students share a commitment to the art and craft of theatre, film, music, and performance and specific skills development takes greater priority than in the General Program. At-home preparation and regular attendance is required, especially for students considering further study in Troupe programs.

All students have the opportunity to perform and showcase their work during our annual Winter Shorts Festival in December and **Expressions Theatre Festival in the spring.**

Program Dates

September 2025 – June 2026

Program Location

All Intensive Programs take place at Granville Island.

Admissions & Registration

Admission to these programs is by application. Prospective students must have completed at least two sessions of Arts Umbrella Theatre training, or equivalent. Students are divided into levels appropriate to age and ability. Student applications are reviewed on a first come first serve basis. We recommend applying early. Acceptance letters will be sent to new students starting June 1, 2025.

Film Acting

Ages 11-16 | Levels 1 & 2

Discover what it's like to be on set and what it takes to get there! Students explore techniques on how to be in the moment, how to surprise themselves in their work, and how to audition for film and television. Students collaborate to make original short films that are screened at multiple times throughout the year.

Musical Theatre

Ages 9-16 | Levels 1, 2, 3, & 4

Students eager to see their skills and confidence grow in Musical Theatre will learn acting techniques, dance and choreography, singing and musicianship, and more. Students build connection, safety, and community, while creating dynamic ensemble and solo performances, culminating in a one-act musical performed at the end of the year.

Note: Musical Theatre Intensives are delivered as a package along with Dance. Students are placed in classes based on age and experience.

Sketch Comedy & Improv

Ages 11-16 | Levels 1 & 2

Through a mixture of improvisation and writing, young actors gain creative thinking, team building, and communication skills that benefit them on the stage and in everyday life. Industry professionals help students develop technique, discipline and artistry. Curriculum is guided by the principles of Viola Spolin's "Improvisation for the Theatre" and Del Close's "Harold" format. Long form, theatre sports, and comedy-based improv are explored at higher levels, once foundations in Spolin-style improvisation are firm.

Stage Combat

Ages 13-19

What do Shakespeare plays and Marvel movies have in common? Stage combat! In this class, students learn basic stance/posture, approaches to consent and safety, safe striking, falling, blocks and parries, grappling, and control. Through structured exercises and play, students work on coordination, balance, strength, endurance, and teamwork to learn how a stage-combat sequence serves to further the development of a story.

Stagecraft

Ages 13-19

Building on skills developed in the Stagecraft General Program, students blend creativity with technical skill, learning design elements of how productions come to life and how to work safely in a scene shop and backstage. They will work directly on the public presentations our programs create throughout the year, with an emphasis on collaborative design and practical use. Led by a combination of talented teachers and guest designers, students will create props, build set pieces, find and create costumes, and design sound and lights as they build the worlds around our Winter Shorts and Expressions productions.

Theatre

Ages 9-16 | Levels 1, 2, & 3

Young actors learn how to improve rehearsal and performance skills through focused theatre exercises, script work, and character studies that encourage mindfulness and self-awareness. Students experiment with emotional and physical character portrayals, learning a variety of theatrical techniques and styles such as Laban, mime, and mask, and breath work to help connect to and access different emotions. The year culminates in a performance of a one-act play as a part of Expressions Festival in the Spring.

Advanced **Programs**

These performing troupes and specialized training programs are designed for teens considering theatre and the performing arts as a career path. Our rich curriculum and program structure offers students a space to sharpen teamwork skills, cooperation, discipline, technique, creative expression, and individual artistry through vocal, movement, and theatre exercises. Many of our students have gone on to post-secondary theatre programs and professional acting careers across the continent.

All students have the opportunity to perform and showcase their work during our annual Winter Shorts Festival in December and Expressions Theatre Festival in the spring. Further performance opportunities may be presented throughout the year.

Program Location

All programs take place at Arts Umbrella Granville Island.

Admissions & Registration

Admission is by audition. Participants are placed according to age, experience, skill, schedule, and the student's goals. Please check website for audition details. Admission takes place on a rolling basis; we recommend auditioning early.

Film Troupe

Aaes 13-19

For the aspiring film actor and maker. Students work together to expand their awareness of the different aspects of movie making, gaining tools to be in the moment, finding honesty in their work, and honing their artistry. Throughout the year, students create short films that are shared with audiences.

Musical Theatre Troupe

Ages 13-19

Young performers train with professional musical theatre artists to gain valuable ensemble and solo performance experience. Actors expand audition repertoire, develop their voice, and learn advanced singing, dancing, and acting techniques. In the Fall, students focus on building ensemble, complex harmonies, and choreography. In the Winter and Spring terms, students expand technique and apply it to staging either a full-length or schoollength Broadway musical.

Sketch Comedy & Improv Troupe

Ages 13-19

Young comedians and improvisers hone their technique through writing and performing individual and group sketches, learning to take ideas from the brain to the page to the stage. Students learn collaboration, communication, creative problem solving, and to trust their instincts through games and classic improv exercises. Long form, theatre sports, and comedy-based improv are explored once foundations in Spolin-style improvisation are firm. Class work becomes performance-ready over the course of the year as students prepare for public shows in the Winter and Spring.

Theatre Troupe

Ages 13-19

Students prepare for an acting career with professional training in acting, voice, and physical theatre technique, focusing on the exploration of improvisation, character work, scene study, and script work to encourage a sense of ensemble and develop strong rehearsal techniques. In the Winter and Spring terms, students continue to hone rehearsal, performance, and production skills, including elements such as lighting, sound, costume, and set, as they prepare to tour and perform a school-length play for students across Metro Vancouver.

Half-Day Professional Training Program in Performing Arts

This program supports those training in Musical Theatre, Theatre, and/or Film Acting, providing intensive instruction, professional coaching and mentorship, and performance opportunities throughout the year for students in Grades 8+.

Designed to prepare young actors with the tools to help them prepare mentally and physically for the demands of a career in the performing arts, students spend a minimum of 25 hours per week at Arts Umbrella, with advanced instruction in singing and musicianship, acting tools and techniques, physical theatre, auditioning, stagecraft, and dance.

Students combine their high-level training with academics through a myriad of online and distributed learning options. Many students choose to attend Magee Secondary School's SPARTS program. Other options include King George Secondary, home schooling, and distributed learning.

Advanced Theatrical Studies Series

For dedicated theatre artists, our Advanced Theatrical Studies Series offers workshops in all aspects of performing arts for stage, screen, and behind the scenes. All workshops offer participants practical and tangible tools and experiential learning as they build their skills and explore new disciplines.

Program Location

All workshops take place at Arts Umbrella Granville Island.

Admissions & Registration

Open to ages 13-19. Previous theatre experience required.

Students engaged with backstage work can explore professional-level lighting and sound creation and design, set and costume design, and stage management. Those looking to enhance performance skills will benefit from our masterclasses in classical acting or voice-over. Those prepping for professional or postsecondary auditions will find methods and support with classes designed to offer practical tools for audition success in theatre and film.

Policies

Age

Students enrolled in sessional programs must be the age of the specific class by session start date. Students enrolled in year-long programs must be the age of the class as of December 31. Arts Umbrella reserves the right to withdraw students who have been registered in an incorrect age category.

Allergies and Sensitivities

Some Arts Umbrella students have lifethreatening allergies. In consideration of these students, we ask that parents/guardians please not pack any of the following in snacks/lunches for consumption at Arts Umbrella: Peanuts, tree nuts, nut products, or shellfish.

Attendance

Every child who attends a class at Arts Umbrella must be registered. Instructors do not have the ability to register students. Attendance is taken at the beginning of each class and unregistered students will be directed to Student Services. No refund or make-up class is available for students who miss class.

Class Cancellation

Arts Umbrella reserves the right to cancel classes that do not meet minimum enrollment, and will cancel classes with an enrollment of 1-3 students up to two weeks prior to the program's scheduled start date. Minimum enrollment numbers depend on studio capacity and availability of materials.

Under most circumstances, cancellations will happen one to two weeks prior to the start date and families will be notified via phone and email. Students from cancelled classes may be transferred to another class free of charge. For classes with three or four enrollments, classes will run for up to two weeks plus two days before a cancellation decision. A pro-rated refund will be issued.

Arts Umbrella will strive to provide a substitute rather than cancel a class in the event of instructor illness. In the case of such a cancellation, a replacement attendance date is scheduled. If it is not possible for Arts Umbrella to schedule a replacement attendance date, a pro-rated refund is supplied to all affected clients. No refund or make up is eligible for students who miss class.

Diapers

For the courtesy of our faculty and other students, we can only accept students who are toilet-trained. Pull up diapers not allowed.

Fees

Applicable program fees must be paid in full upon registration. Late registration for sessional programs is not eligible to be pro-rated due to missed classes. Payment can be made by cheque, cash, VISA, American Express, or MasterCard. A charge of \$25 will apply to returned cheques.

Field Trips

Instructors may lead supervised excursions during class time. Parental permission for these excursions is required at time of registration. Student Services staff are informed of location and times for excursions by instructors before

leaving the building.

Health and Safety

The health and safety of our students, staff, and families is important to us. Students are not permitted to attend class if they are exhibiting any symptoms of a cold, flu or COVID-19, such as fever, cough, shortness of breath, sore throat and difficulty swallowing, coughing or sneezing, or other symptoms as described by the Public Health Agency of Canada, the BC Ministry of Health and BC Centre for Disease Control, or is required to self-isolate.

Illness or Injury

Refunds will not be provided for missed classes unless withdrawal is recommended by a medical practitioner, in which case a pro-rated refund will be provided upon receipt of a doctor's note.

Language

For safety reasons, we ask that your child has a working understanding of English before attending classes. For students who do not have a working understanding of English, please contact Student Services in advance of the class start date, so we can make the appropriate accommodations for your child.

Accessibility & Learning Supports

Arts Umbrella is actively working to support students with accessibility or additional learning needs. To help us create a welcoming/inclusive learning environment, please let Student Services staff know if your child has any access or support needs for their time at Arts Umbrella. If your child requires an aide in school, then an adult or aide should be present at Arts Umbrella classes, as it will help ensure your child has a more supported arts experience.

Parent Drop-off & Pick-Up

Arts Umbrella is not responsible for students before, after, or between classes. Parents or guardians late in picking up students will be charged \$10 per 15 mins. Repeated lateness may lead to discharge from the class with no refund. Students under the age of 13 must be brought to and from class by an adult on their authorized pick-up list provided during registration. Please notify Student Services with any changes to this list or to inform of any unexpected lateness.

Program Changes

Instructors and/or program content may change at Arts Umbrella's discretion, without notice. Information found on our online registration system should be considered the most upto-date. Some programs and classes may have specific requirements and policies. Visit artsumbrella.com or contact Student Services for details.

Publicity and Advertising

Parental permission is requested at time of registration for Arts Umbrella to photograph and film students and their work for advertising and publicity purposes. Arts Umbrella reserves the right to use student artwork for exhibition at no charge.

Removal for Conduct

Arts Umbrella reserves the right to remove any student or parent who fails to comply with its

policies, or who engages in any activity deemed contrary to the fulfillment of Arts Umbrella's objectives. In such an event, Arts Umbrella will be owed the fees for the complete session. Bursary recipients will be asked to reimburse the full value of any bursaries used toward their current registration. Read the code of conduct at artsumbrella.com/conduct.

Withdrawal Fees and Deadlines

Please submit withdrawal and transfer requests in writing. Non-attendance or non-payment of outstanding fees does not constitute a formal withdrawal. In all programs, a pro-rated refund will be issued for a withdrawal if a doctor's note is provided. Please note, this policy applies from the time of registration up until the stated deadlines.

Fall/Winter/Spring Sessional Programs

Withdrawal or transfer requests must be received in person, by phone, or in writing up to and including 48 hours after the 2nd class of the session. Transfer requests prior to this deadline are offered at no additional charge except for any difference in course fees. Withdrawal requests before this deadline will be refunded less 10% of the tuition fee.

Spring Break/Summer Sessional Programs

Withdrawal or transfer requests must be received in person, by phone, or in writing at least 2 weeks [14 days] before the start of camp. Transfer requests prior to this deadline are offered at no additional charge except for any difference in course fees. Withdrawal requests before this deadline will be refunded less 10% of the tuition fee.

Yearlong Programs

Withdrawal requests must be received in person, by phone, or in writing a minimum of 2 weeks before the first class. Withdrawal requests before this deadline will be refunded less the \$100 deposit. After this period, late withdrawals will be refunded with the following deductions:

- 30% deduction before September 30
- 50% deduction up to, and including December 1
- No refund after December 1

Post-Secondary Dance Program

Arts Umbrella follows the VCC policy and will refund program fees to students who withdraw (voluntarily or involuntarily) as follows:

- Prior to the start day of the program: 100% refund (less \$100 administrative fee and non-refundable portion of the tuition deposit)
- Up to and including the fifth (5th) business day from the start of the program: 50% refund of tuition
- After the fifth (5th) business day of the program: No refund of tuition
